had a great time for my exchange program in Hokkaido University. On the weekend before I start, I was welcomed by a 5th grade student. He showed me the way to the dorm and a brief orientation around the hospital. He also gave me a weekly schedule of each department, which I think is very convenient so that I know what I'm going to do and where I could go.

In the Neurosurgery department, I get to see all kinds of difficult surgeries (for this is a medical center handling with more complicated cases) including cranioplasty for a kid with craniosynostosis, aneurysm clipping, and several tumor resection deep on the skull base. I also get to practice microsurgery on silicon tube!

Besides surgery, there are also lectures on stroke, spine, and clinical imaging. I learned a lot from the lessons.

Then in the Orthopedic department, I get to see the correction of scoliosis, total knee replacement. The doctors even let me scrub on to stand closer and have a better view of the total hip replacement.

The teachers and residents in both departments are so nice and helpful. They explained the surgery in the operating room and gave lectures in English so that I could understand.

I really enjoyed the time in Hokkaido University and Hokudai Hospital!

had a fantastic clinical attachment with the departments of Respiratory Medicine and Medical Oncology at the Hokkaido University hospital. I learned a diverse range of knowledge and skills. For the department of Respiratory Medicine, I received invaluable tutorials on COPD, asthma, pulmonary function tests, and heart murmurs. I also got to witness bronchoscopy and as a bonus, a real-time tumor-tracking radiotherapy procedure, which I never knew existed. I am also very thankful for the doctors for taking the time and having the patience to translate the clinical cases in English for me despite their busy schedules. I feel like I have a much better understanding of what is involved in a career as a respiratory physician, which has further consolidated my interest in this

subspecialty.

For the department of Medical Oncology, I learned a lot about the treatment regimens of various cancers. This was invaluable for me as I never studied oncology in my university. I was exposed a lot to cases of head and neck cancers, which I had never formally studied. In addition, I can now appreciate the mechanisms of action of various chemotherapy drugs, as well as the vast amount of research taking place in this field. Although I feel like oncology isn't the specialty for me, I thoroughly enjoyed this attachment.

## From University of Malaya, Malaysia

he past 6 weeks in Hokkaido University Hospital, I have spent in 3 different departments, Department of Gastroenterology and Hepatology, Department of Cardiovascular surgery and Department of Cardiovascular medicine. Being in a different country has exposed me to the different type of modalities offered here in Japan when compared to Malaysia. For example, some investigations that are rarely done in Malaysia such as the double enteroscopy are quite common here in Japan. I also got the opportunity to observe the procedure during my week with the Inflammatory Bowel Disease group. It is also refreshing to see the different type of cases here in Japan.

In Malaysia, most of the patients in the cardiovascular ward are warded due to ischemic heart disease. But here in Hokkaido University Hospital, there are more variations such as valvular heart disease, aortic dissection

The biggest challenge would definitely be the language barrier. But, nonetheless all the doctors were kind enough to try to translate to English for me especially during ward rounds.

In a nutshell, these past 6 weeks have been a great experience and exposure for me. I am eternally grateful for the opportunity to do my clinical attachment here in Hokkaido University Hospital.
