





he hospital departments that I was in made me feel accommodated and occupied. Many patients had complex or uncommon conditions that would not often be encountered in Singapore. Initially, I was worried that I would be missing out during ward rounds and other clinical activities because I do not speak Japanese. However, the doctors would very patiently discuss each patient's case with me in English and address any questions I had. Much of what I learnt is thanks to their enthusiasm and passion for teaching. I was also left in awe by the hospital's 'hardware', such as the advanced endoscopic techniques used. However, it is not only the 'heartware' that impressed me the most – I will never forget how everyone, be it senior consultants, junior residents, nurses or patients, treated each other with utmost respect. rom the first day onwards, the staff at Hokkaido University and the hospital were extremely warm and welcoming to me. In my time at the Department of Neurosurgery, I got the opportunity to witness a variety of advanced technology in the operating theatre. I was very impressed and amazed by this. I also got to see complex medical cases and surgeries in my 2 weeks there. In my time at the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, I saw a wide variety of cases as well. The staff were extremely kind to me, and encouraged me to participate as much as possible. This made me feel more involved and made my experience more meaningful. (Paul)

The doctors and healthcare professionals I met in Hokkaido University Hospital were very welcoming and approachable. They took time to give me bedside tutorials, lectures and brought me around to observe medical and surgical procedures. Four weeks into my posting, a magnitude 6.6 earthquake struck Hokkaido at 3 am on 6 September, a Thursday morning, and the main power plant was shut down. It was my first experience with a natural disaster, and it was terrifying, not only because of the initial severe shakes, but also the worry of when electricity and water supply would return. Nonetheless, I was awed by the how everyone responded. The Japanese gueued up in an orderly manner to purchase food, water and other daily necessities, taking only what they required, in view of limited supplies. In the absence of functional traffic lights, pedestrians and cars waited patiently and took turns to cross. People also voluntarily opened their homes to share shower facilities, meals, and many took to the streets to clear up debris caused by the earthquake. The next day, when the electricity was restored in a few malls, many stores set up extension cords and charging ports for everyone to use freely. This experience not only boosted my medical knowledge, I also learnt about the kindness and resilience of the Japanese, and I went home better appreciating the fragility of life. (Isabelle)
