t was my first time in Japan. Being nervous for not speaking Japanese and totally new to the environment, I was relieved when a 4th year medical student, Rino helped me to settle down on the night I arrived. During the first days in Hokkaido, the details provided in previous thoughtful emails was also a big help. Getting used to life in Hokkaido was easier than expected, as everyone here was helpful and polite.

Dr. Maeda was my supervisor in the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery. He was a kind and patient mentor, translating every case into English for me. I got to observe various surgeries I have never seen during my previous rotation in Taiwan, such as cleft lip and cleft palate surgery and also some rare cases such as cranial bone malformation, which you could feel warm brain tissue beneath the scalp. Most of all, Dr. Maeda even arranged for me to practice microsurgery on a silicon tube!

In the Department of Dermatology, Dr. Nomura, a joyous and warm professor, introduced me to the big family. Different professors and residents took turns to guide me in the ward, outpatient department and operation theatre, and I got to see some severe malignant cases, such as lymphoma, which were rare in my own hospital. The largest difference is the Japanese dermatologists emphasize a lot on pathology, and they even have a CPC every week to discuss about the pathological diagnoses.

In a nutshell, I had a fruitful 4 weeks in Hokkaido University, and it was really hard to part with the people and lifestyle which I have been getting fonder and fonder with.

Thanks again to all the doctors, medical students and staff, I am eternally grateful for the opportunity to do my clinical attachment in this wonderful place.


tutors enriched our experience.
