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

had the incredible opportunity to complete a 2 week clinical elective with Hokkaido University's Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery Department. I was warmly greeted by the doctors and other staff members which made me feel at ease. During my placement, I saw a variety of procedures including

auriculoplasty for cup ears, rectus abdominis free flap post-parotidectomy and cleft palate surgery. I was given the opportunity to scrub in for surgeries and Dr Maeda explained each surgical procedure in detail which I really appreciated. I also joined outpatient clinics such as Cleft lip/palate, keloid scars and cancer clinics. During these clinics, I had the opportunity to perform physical examinations, learned how to use the ultrasound machine and the doctors kindly explained the patient cases in English so that I could understand. I also attended the Suturing classes where I learned surgical knot tying and a variety of suturing techniques such as simple interrupted and vertical and horizontal mattress sutures.
