I have had an interest in the Japanese language for years, and applied for this elective through my university, to get an insight into medical education in Japan.

Every Monday and Friday I got to watch and assist on surgeries, where I learned a lot, since plastic surgery at the Hokkaido University Hospital is quite versatile. During the week, I observed patient interviews and examinations, and every Wednesday there was suture practice, which improved my skills in the operating room. When there was time, the staff often made an effort to introduce me to various aspects of Japan's culture, and made sure I had everything I needed. fter completing 2 weeks of Nephrology and 2 weeks of Oncology, my experience and knowledge of these medical specialties has vastly improved.

During my placement in Nephrology, I experienced a wide variety of renal based pathology and was also able to improve my clinical skills. In Hokkaido University Hospital, the medical oncology team specialized in rare cancers. My confidence in oncological management has improved, I learned about common chemotherapy regimens, and complications associated with chemotherapy as well as immune related adverse effects (IrAE's).

I also attended out-patient clinics in both Nephrology and Oncology. Witnessing the interaction between Japanese doctors and patients was illuminating. I learned that when Japanese doctors communicate with their patients, what is left unsaid is equally as important as what is directly

had an extremely enjoyable experience during my two weeks here, and the doctors were very friendly and willing to teach. On our first day, we were warmly greeted by Professor Murakami, who energetically gave us an orientation of the hospital. Subsequently, I was introduced to the team and watched a laparoscopic sleeve gastrectomy on my first day. We even got to meet the dean during our second day. All the doctors knew English (although with varying proficiency levels) and I could understand them well during our interactions. They explained the patients' conditions to me, so that I knew their background before attending the operations. Even the head of department, Dr Hirano Satoshi, gave me some short tutorials despite his busy schedule. The students frequently engaged me in conversation, and one of them even brought us around on the weekends to explore Hokkaido. Shakotan and Cape Kamui were amazing places to visit!

Through the experience, I was able to learn more about the Japanese healthcare system, which contrasted greatly with that of Singapore's. I had plentiful exposure to esophageal, gastric, and pancreatic cancers (as well as benign conditions like intraductal papillary mucinous neoplasms), some of which are rarer in Singapore. There were many opportunities to experience the Japanese culture, and I even had the opportunity to go to an izakaya (a Japanese-style bar) with the team.
