During my rotation in the emergency department, the sound of an emergency call was something I both anticipated and feared, as it meant another critically ill patient was arriving. I vividly remember the physicians and nurses waiting at the entrance, fully prepared for a life-or-death resuscitation. Once the patient was brought in, everyone worked efficiently assessing vital signs, securing IV access, and placing arterial or central lines to stabilize blood pressure before sending the patient for imaging.

Although many patients arrived in cardiac arrest, some survived and were admitted to the emergency ICU for further care. Through these cases, I learned essential principles of critical care, from managing septic shock, DIC, and hypothermia to treating high-fall trauma and acute myocardial infarction. Daily morning conferences allowed me to closely follow each patient's clinical course. Despite the language barrier, the staff made every effort to communicate with me in English and help me understand the workflow of Hokkaido University Hospital's emergency department.

As a Taiwanese exchange student, this experience has been profoundly meaningful. I am truly grateful for the opportunity to learn in such a professional and compassionate environment. I sincerely wish everyone in the Emergency Medicine Department continued health and success, and I hope our paths will cross again in the future.
